IRF - RA REGIONAL CONFERENCE 4[™] TO 6[™] MAY 2015, SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA

Over 350 road industry leaders from 15 countries came together at the 'IRF-RA Regional Conference' held in Sydney from May 4 to 6, 2015 to reaffirm the sector's commitment to achieving new benchmarks in global road safety and innovation and best practice in the design, construction and operation of road networks.

'Road Safety' was a key theme of this first ever joint regional conference hosted by International Road Federation (IRF) Geneva and Roads Australia (RA), along with innovation and value for money, procurement and delivery of infrastructure. IRF Chairman, Mr. K.K. Kapila and Roads Australia President Mr. David Stuart Watt, in a joint statement, expressed confidence that the conference would enable sharing learning and strengthen relationships.

Coinciding with the UN Global Road Safety Week, the Conference Programme included more than 90 presentations by industry leaders on diverse **themes** – ITS, Funding and Financing, Pavement and New materials, Asset Management, Procurement, Sustainability and Safety.

The IRF General Assembly and Board Meeting took place on 3rd May 2015, back to back with the Conference.

IRF India Chapter along with CRRI participated in the Conference and also importantly, in the **Exhibition** held on the occasion. Along with its own exhibits, IRF proudly showcased the achievements of a few of its Members – C&C Constructions Ltd., Engineering Projects India Ltd., Gammon India Limited, Intercontinental

Consultants & Technocrats Pvt. Ltd. and Maccaferri. The exhibits evoked interest among the many participants who visited the stalls.

The Conference Main dinner, attended by over 500 guests and during which the 'John Shaw Medal' was presented to the winner (Golder's roads specialist Mr. Reg Leach), a Sydney Harbour Cruise and site visits to Sydney Transport Management Centre and Sydney Orbital Network were some of the main highlights of the event.

IST MEETING OF IRF CORE COMMITTEE -WORLD ROAD MEET (WRM) 2017 ON 5TH JUNE 2015 - A REPORT

The Core Committee that has been set up by the Conference Chairman, Mr. K.K. Kapila to initiate deliberation and generate ideas on organizing the WRM 2017, which will be hosted in India on November 14-17, 2017, met in New Delhi on 5th June 2015.

In his opening remarks, Mr. K.K. Kapila, Chairman, IRF GPC and Founding Chairman, IRF India Chapter said that the WRM, the most important meeting of the road sector is an all encompassing event. A star highlight of this event in India is planned to be a **Ministerial Meet of Global Transport Ministers**, which would add glamour to the event. The number of delegates would also expectedly increase as each Minister would be accompanied by his entourage. The Prime Minister or the President of India would be invited to inaugurate the Global Ministerial Meet. High level dignitaries from various UN or other international bodies such as the President of the World Bank/ADB/EU would also be invited to attend. The total number of expected delegates would be around 3000.

Dates announced for the Meet are 14-17 November 2017. As per convention, these dates would be formally announced at the upcoming Korea Meet.

Venues, large enough to accommodate around 3000 Conference delegates and the Exhibition that is planned alongside, would be shortlisted. Various factors such as location, accessibility and connectivity, space availability, facilities provided, hotel accommodation etc. must be considered.

The meeting appointed Sub-groups for spade work on Event Management and drafting the WRM Conference Programme.

Three committees at the international level are planned to be set up, each committee having 15 to 20 members from different countries. The Committee are – (i) Organizing Committee, (ii) Technical Committee and (iii) Exhibition Committee. The International Organizing Committee would be assisted by various sub-committees such as Venue Committee, Transport Committee, First-aid Committee, Catering Committee etc.

Various road related organizations in IRF member countries would be entrusted responsibility of marketing this event in their respective countries. Some international experts have already agreed to participate on the international committees and others are being addressed for this purpose.

The **Call for Papers** would be hosted on the IRF website shortly. Poster Sessions would also be scheduled. There would be four to five main sessions daily, with two to three parallel sessions for each main session.

The Committee also deliberated on various related points: Accessing Member Data Base of Organizations, Budget, Publicity, Online Services and Marketing.

The Concluding Session would close with a presentation of the **Conference Recommendations** by the Conference Chairman.

9[™] IRF REGIONAL CONFERENCE – ORGANISING AND TECHNICAL COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON 12[™] JUNE 2015 IN NEW DELHI

The Organising Committee and Technical Committee, set up by the Conference Chairman, Mr. K.K. Kapila, jointly met in New Delhi on 12th June 2015 to deliberate on various action points regarding the 9th IRF Regional Conference, which will be held in New Delhi on October 5-6, 2015.

Warmly welcoming the participants to the meeting, the Conference Chairman elaborated upon the theme of the 9th Regional Conference, which is particularly important keeping in view that we are now already half way through the 'UN Decade of Action for Road Safety', the targets of which the Government of India stands committed to. He informed the members about the Road Safety Matrix, developed with inputs from all State Departments, to ensure that all stakeholders are on the same page as far as promoting road safety is concerned. This matrix will help in identifying gaps in achievements with regard to targets, so that all the State and Central organizations and departments can see the progress and action needed to address these gaps.

The Hon'ble Prime Minister of India is being approached to inaugurate the 9th IRF Regional Conference. His presence on the occasion would surely elevate the Road Safety Mission. Referring to IRF's attempts for Road safety to be placed on a higher pedestal in the UN Sustainable Development Goals which are updated every five years and are due to be updated shortly, he mentioned that IRF GPC has also taken up the matter with the European Union to ask its UN members to vote to place road safety at a higher level.

Mr. N.K. Sinha, Chairman, IRF India Chapter further highlighted the fact that as a consequence of this concern, the format of the 9th Regional Conference Programme would now focus on the India experience, providing expert advice and interactive sessions.

The Chairman of the Technical Committee Mr. S.N. Das, DG (RD), MoRT&H, drew attention to the increased emphasis now also being placed on long term measures for road safety activities, in addition to the previous preoccupation largely with short term measures.

Elaborating on the Programme Structure drawn up for the Conference, Prof. P.K. Sikdar, Advisor, IRF IC, mentioned that the sub-themes of the Technical Sessions were aligned with the five pillars of road safety, enunciated as important components of the UN Decade of Action for Road Safety, and issues devolving from them. Speakers identified for this purpose have been instrumental in the development of the five pillars.

The Committee members deliberated on various issues related to the Conference, among them the need for instituting uniform road safety structures in the States. It was agreed that the structure that is already in place in States needs to be reviewed and the best experiences to be

shared. Haryana and Tamil Nadu are two States, which are proactive in Road safety matters, from whom many lessons can be learnt.

The need for funding the structure with a full time nodal officer being appointed to coordinate with different departments was also discussed. It was mentioned that in Haryana, 40% of fines collected by the Traffic Police are now ploughed back into Road Safety Fund.

The importance of ensuring the ground level implementation of findings of Road Safety Audits that have been carried out in different States was also discussed.

A Conference Souvenir would be brought out on the occasion and all members are requested to contribute articles on road safety related topics for inclusion in the Souvenir.

CYCLISTS: USE REFLECTIVE TAPES FOR SAFETY! (bhp.com)

Bicycle riders are often at the receiving end of road mishaps globally. The situation is all the more grave in India, where even motorists bear the brunt of bad infrastructure and poor driver discipline. The main issue for cyclists is that motorists often fail to spot them, however alert they may be. Visibility is the most basic form of safety and the International Centre for Automotive Technology (ICAT), has found that the traditional retro-reflectors currently being used by domestic bicycle manufacturers are of an inferior quality and do not conform with the basic photometric requirements as per the ISO 6742-2 standards set for retro reflectors.

Instead of retro reflectors, the Union Ministry of Road Transport and Highways has stressed the use of retro reflective tape and fluorescent paint. Mr. Nitin Gadkari, Union Minister of Road Transport, has already written to Union Minister of Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution - Mr. Ram Vilas Paswan to update the safety standards of bicycles. This includes a mandate to use retro reflective tapes on certain parts of bicycles for better visibility.

According to Mr. Gadkari's letter, around 6,600 cyclists were killed in road accidents in 2012 alone. Over 50% of those fatalities reportedly took place in Uttar Pradesh and Tamil Nadu alone.

RETRO REFLECTIVE TAPES MUST ON BICYCLES TO REDUCE ACCIDENTS: IRF

International Road Federation (IRF) said the International Centre for Automotive Technology (ICAT) found the traditional retro-reflectors used by the domestic bicycle manufacturers to be of inferior quality and not conforming to standards. It said Union Minister Mr. Nitin Gadkari had last year written to Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution Minister Mr. Ram Vilas Paswan for ensuring safety standards for bicycles, including provisions for fixation of retro reflective tapes, at specified spots to make them visible during night. Bicycle users are one of the most vulnerable road users, susceptible to high rate of road accidents. In 2012 alone, about 6,600 cyclists were killed in road accidents. "Poor visibility of bicycle riders due to lack of proper reflective devices installed on bicycles is major reason for the high rate of accidents with motorised vehicles," Gadkari had said in the letter.

IRF Chairman Mr. K.K. Kapila said the organisation, along with Ministry of Road Transport, will fix reflective tapes on bicycles free of cost so that riders could be easily spotted by drivers of other vehicles at night.
